Commemorative Service Held At Sneek Cemetery

Special:— On Thursday the 30th August 1945 the Sneek Comittee for the Preservation of Canadian Military Graves held a short but impressive ceremony at the local cemetery.

The Sneek Troop of Boy Scouts under the supervision of Scoutmaster Boot are the attendants of the six graves occupied by fallen neroes of The Queen's Own Rifles. The Scouts are to be complimented on the wonderful care they have taken and are showing daily for our dead controlled.

The ceremonies took place under the direction of the Rev. Nauta of Sneek. After the Perth Guard of Honour and the Boy Scouts had taken their places about the graves, Rev. Nauta opened Continued page 2

the service with a commendable address about the tie which now held our two countries together.

The H/Major Philips, Chief Protestant Chaplain of 5 Can. Div. added a few words of kindness to the Dutch people for their respect of our dead soldiers and encouraged the relationship of the Dutch and Canadians which now exists in

Rev. Dr. De Vos, the President of the Contact Committee, Canada, Sneek and Scoutmaster Boot also made short addresses about the sacrifices our country has made for the liberation of all liberty loving countries. As Scoutmaster Boot closed his address, two Scouts broke and unfurled the Canadian Flag from a post, centre and behind the graves. The ladies of the Committee attending then came forward and deposited flowers on each grave, the Boy Scouts dipped their colours and the Perth Guard of Honour presented arms in a General Salute.

Rev. Nauta then spoke a few words in closing and the H/Major Philips said the Lord's Prayer and the Benediction. The Guard of Honour, under the command of Capt. J. M. Dent, Lieut. M. Storey and Lieut. T. Harris marched off to their forming up point followed by the Boy Scouts.

The Honoured Dead of the Queen's Own Rifles were:

After the completion of the ceremony, Major Philips conveyed sincere admiration for the soldierly fashion in which the Guard had carried out their duty at the burial grounds. He mentioned his being present at many similar affairs but to his knowledge he had never seen a better turned-out group of well sized men. To the men who participated in this Guard go our appreciation for a task well done.

Special:- Tuesday 4th September 1945, marked 'the sixth anniversary of the mustering of the Perth Regiment for Active Service. The day was set aside by the Commanding Officer for the purpose of commemorating the service and sacrifice of all ranks associated with the

Regiment in this war.

At 1030 hours there were seven hundred smartly turned out Perth soldiers on the Sport Field awaiting the arrival of the Acting G. O. C., Brigadier I. S. Johnston. The G. O. C.'s vehicle pulled into the field exactly on time and after taking the General Salute, he asked the men to move around his jeep so that all could hear the few words he had to say. He congratulated the troops on their splendid appearance then he gave a brief resume of the glorious history of the Perths. He stressed the importance of making use of the present period to cement old friendships, form new ones and to become steeped in the Perth tradition of co-operation and comradeship and to use this tradition as a buffer against the selfish individualism and dollar worship which is peacetime normaly and which most had forgotten.

The G. O. C. then proceeded to the Town Hall and there took the salute as the Battalion

marched past.

In the afternoon our Regimental softball stalwarts defeated the 69th Fd. Tpt. Coy. R. C. A. S. C. in the opener of the Army semifinals. The final score of a remarkably well played game was: Perths 5, 69th Fd. 1.

A street dance was held for the troops in the evening while the Sergeants and Officers enjoyed

the festivities in their own messes.

He was then attached to 5 CAB W/S who were then at Rowlers, Belgium. From the Workshops he went C.O.F. that was early in July. He returned from C.O.F. on August 28th and is he ever happy about it.


