A good step had been taken earlier in the month when some of the vehicles had all ready been classified and the motorcycles turned in en masse. All 406's are to be completed by Nov 23 for all vehicles. We are, indeed, on the move. Continuing the Canada-Holland celebrations the Plaza was thrown open for the conduction of Bridge and ping-pong tournaments as well as a Dutch card game in which our men took an active part: some even did so well as to win some of the prizes which were donated jointly by the YMCA and the civilians. Judging from the enthusiasm thus far our final week should be one to remember for soldiers and civilians alike. Administratively the unit was quiet as there were no leaves and no cross-postings.
