# A NETHERLAND'S CHRISTMAS

The origin of Santa Claus and a typical Holland Xmas as explained by Dr. H. de Vos of Sneek, in the following article.

The whole Perth Regiment is invited by the CCCS, to a Dutch Santa Claus feast which will be held in the Church Hall at 8 o'clock on Monday 26 November. We sincerely hope that you will all come, however, before you do you must know a little about the feast because you do not know it in Canada and Santa Claus in Holland is not the same as Santa Claus in

The feast here is a feast in honour or Saint Nicholas who was a Bishop of Dyrain, Asia Minor, where he died on 6th December 3rd of 343. It is on the day of his death that his feast is kept. During his life he did many miracles which all showed his charity and kindness, towards men, especially towards the poor and the children. This may be the origin of the feast as

it is kept now. Centuries ago the people here celebrated the feast of "Sainter Klass" (Saint Lord Claus). It was a feast especially for the children. During the night of 5-6 Dec, he rides over the roofs of houses on his white horse, - This by the way reminds us of Wustan who rides through the air on his white horse - Through the chimney Santa Claus, clothed as a Bishop enters the house, there he finds wooden shoes and shoes with bread, hay and some water for the horse. He replaces the food with presents. The children having sung their songs to the chimney the evening before awake very early, anxious to know what Santa Claus has brought to them. they came out of their beds and when they have their presents they sing their songs of gratitude again. Only the naughty child gets a rod, but on the feast of Santa Claus there are very few

naughty children. When the children grow older they wait with their families for Santa Claus, who comes in person to bring the presents. He is accompanied by a little Negro called Black Peter who is his servant. Santa Claus who arrives from Spain, his home, has a big sack and a rod. He puts the naughty children into his sack. When the children grow older and no longer believe in Santa Claus, the evening is spent by playing games, drinking chocolate and eating "tasi-tasi (a sort of (a kind of ginger bread) "speculars" cake) "pepernoten" (ginger bread nuts).

The finest moment of the feast is when the presents which are all put together are distributed. Each package contains a poem, maybe a very bad one, but that does not matter with everyone joking at such a time. On the feast of Santa Claus you may say more than at any other time, but only joking and not love.

We cannot give you exactly such a feast, but you shall have your feast of Santa Claus. Santa Claus and his servant Black Peter will be there in person, there will be something to eat and drink and a small present for each of you, there will be jokes, and a revue, with bits played by Canadians and others played by "Sneeklans" There will be lots of fun and we hope you can

all be there.

This being the last issue of The Perthonian due to our repatriation to Canada we took the opportunity of changing the subject and obtained interviews from mes of the Regiment on the following: "A SHORT STATEMENT OF THANKS AND FAREWELL TO THE PEOPLE OF SNEEK".

## MILITARY MEDAL

A. 11100 Sergeant John Robert SPENCER
THE PERTH REGIMENT of CANADA

On the night of 28 April 1945 Sergean-SPENCER was a member of "B" Company of THE PERTH REGIMENT, which was holding a position on the WESTERN side of the canal in the town of HOLWEIRDE. A portion of the town on the EASTERN side of the canal was held by the enemy.

was held by the enemy.

Af about 2230 hours Sergeant SPENCER observed an enemy patrol on the WESTERN bank of the canal SOUTH of the town. On his own initiative and alone, Sergeant SPENCER stalked the enemy and succeeded in capturing all three members of the patrol.

The enemy patrol provided information which enabled Sergeant SPENCER to cross the river to the enemy-held part of the town, where with great skill he moved about the enemy positions in darkness and returned to his Company with detailed information of the enemy's dispositions and strength. With this information the Company Commander was able to plan and carry out an attack on the morning of 29 April. The attack was successful despite strong opposition and the enemy were driven from HOLWEIRDE.

During the attack Sergeant SPENCER was in the vanguard at all times, clearing enemy from one basement strongpoint after another, during the course of which he personally captured thirty five prisoners.

The dash, initiative and determination displayed by Sergeant SPENCER was largely responsible for the success of the Company attack.


# UP AND DOWN STATION STREET


