2. DISCIPLINE

1. INJURIES RESULTING FROM PETROL FIRES

(a) Fifteen per cent of all injuries to soldiers in this theatre (other than wounds received in action) are caused by burns from petrol fires. The great majority of these are the result of negligence on the part of individuals who fail to appreciate the dangerously inflammable nature of petrol when used as fuel.

(b) Attention will be drawn in staff and unit orders to the danger of using petrol cookers without proper precautions. In all cases where injuries from petrol fires are shown to be the result of negligence whether on the part of the injured man or of another, disciplinary action will be taken.

2. SALUTING

(a) When two or more other ranks are walking out and pass an offr or offrs, all the senior ranks will salute as laid down in the manual of Elementary Drill (All Arms), 1935, Sec 74.

(b) A salute made to two or more offrs in a street or other public place out of doors will be returned by all the offrs saluted. In camp, unit lines, etc, on parade, the salute will be returned by the senior offr only.

(c) When two British offrs meet an Allied offr or offrs, all British offrs will return salute or acknowledge the salute of the Allied offr, etc, etc. The rank of the British or Allied offr is immaterial.

The badge or insignia of allied forces should be studied by all ranks.

(d) All ranks will salute offr of higher rank in cars which display unauthorized flags or bunting. The latter distinguishing signs, which are covered when the offr is travelling, consist of red material on plates which one or more stars according to rank displayed on the front and rear of the car.

(e) Saluting arms. In the time of armour, the salute representing the motion of a knight raising the visor of his helmet with the open hand to the front and up into it, though raised, it contained no missile.

The practice of combining "eyes right" or eyes left with the salute originated in the olden days, when it was the privilege of men-at-arms to look their superiors in the face, while others must pass with downcast eyes.

The salute therefore is a recognition of comradeship and mutual trust between men-at-arms; it is, at the same time, an acknowledgment of discipline and is also a visible indication of common allegiance which all ranks owe to the Crown and its service.

The standard of saluting is, therefore an indication of the esprit-de-corps of units and formations. History, and the experience of the present war, have proved that high esprit-de-corps and good discipline increase the efficiency of units and formations.

The recognition of comradeship and mutual trust inherent in the salute must be mutual and not one-sided, e.g. both parties must look each other in the eyes, and offrs receiving the salute must return it in a smart, soldierly and courteous manner. The slovenly return of a salute cannot but breed slovenly behaviour. The offr will, therefore, return the salute in a proper manner and will invariably look the giver in the eyes.

(f) Offrs and soldiers, in the front, will show by the standard of their saluting their determination to maintain with pride the reputation of their unit, "The Fort Regiment".

3. SECURITY

(a) During recent months the enemy has been sending large numbers of espionage and sabotage agents into Allied occupied territory disguised as refugees. Accordingly, the following measures will be enforced to combat this activity:-

(i) All refugees coming from enemy territory will be rounded up by forward troops and evacuated under guard to PW cage in the same manner as DS.

(ii) In the event of operating areas civilians who are observed to be circulating, or particularly, or behaving in a suspicious manner, will be arrested and handed over to 2 NZ DIV TS SEC which is located at 2 NZ HQ 2 NZ DT.

(iii) All civilian labour units must be checked by TS Secs before employment.

(iv) RPLMC Civil Police and their auxiliaries as Auxiliary Police, whose duty it is to maintain the security of civilians moving in rear areas, will be given every assistance.

(b) It is emphasised that these counter-measures necessitate the fullest co-operation of all troops. Personnel of TS Secs are in a position to determine whether civilians are genuine or not, and any doubtful case should be referred to them.

4. CENSORSHIP

(a) Troops may now state in letters home that they have witnessed the eruption of VESUVIUS provided that:-

(a) The subject is NOT discussed in Green Envelope letters.

(b) No dates are mentioned.

(c) The writer's unit or HQ is not linked in any way with his personal account other than by correct return address at the head of the letter, e.g. It is not permissible for the writer to state that his unit or HQ was either far from or near to the eruption.
